

This board eliminates the posting of items to the old-fashioned recapitulation sheet, and is particularly adaptable to Sales Analysis, where in many cases, the original figures can be used, eliminating all posting except the final Sales. Profit or Commodity Totals.

As indicated in the illustration, the strips containing the items to be distributed are shingled on the board and by merely adding across, the department totals are quickly secured.

Instruction Service Department

RECENT letter from an operator, asking "when was the Comptometer Correspondence Instruction Course first started," reminds us of the astonished youth who, when he tackled a faro game for the first time and won his first three bets in succession, exclaimed, "My, how long has this thing been going on anyhow?" To him it seemed "Too good to be true." Maybe the same thought respecting the Comptometer Course was in the mind of our correspondent. Who knows?

Well, many moons have waxed and waned-if that is what the moon does to kill time-since the first Comptometer operator wrote to ask, "Is there a shorter and quicker way of doing this problem on the Comptometer?" The date of that inquiry? Frankly now, if we were to name the date the remoteness of it might cause you operators to say, after taking a few taps on your Comptometer, "Well, the Professor isn't so young any more, is he?" We admit the soft impeachment, but even at that it may surprise you to learn that there are not enough silver threads among the black to write a song about.

But to get back on the main track. Accompanying that first inquiry was of course a statement of the problem and an explanation of the method employed in the operator's solution of it. It was not the last letter of the kind that came to us. More followed, rather infrequently at first, but with the passing of the years their number increased. Gradually, more and more clerks were required to handle the correspondence. The demand for broader and more analytical statistical information in business was growing.

This naturally gave rise to new problems in the figure work of accounting. Deeper interest in means and methods for handling such work with greater economy and dispatch was everywhere evident. As a result of it all, we had more and more calls for our service until finally we awoke to the realization that we had on our hands a full-fledged and vigorous department of correspondence instruction.

Today this Department is an important adjunct to our great Comptometer School system, which extends not only

throughout the United States and Canada but to foreign lands as well. Not all our incoming mail for this Department is confined to strictly routine matters. Many of the letters are from operators expressing their appreciation of this service and the benefits derived from it. Others are from firms and corporations who have taken the trouble to write and tell us of improvement in the work of their operators, due to our system of instructions.

The First Comptometer School

DORR E. FELT

I have persuaded Mr. Hess that as the first Comptometer operator in the world he should give me a little space in the Comptometer News.

The Comptometer being the first multiple-column, key-operated adding or calculating machine, it was some task to devise methods for easily performing even the simpler arithmetical computations. For instance,

three systems for performing square root had to be tested out, two systems for performing division had to be devised.

The early operators were all men. The first ones I taught were George W. Martin, a teacher in a business college in Chicago, and George D. Mackay, a student in the same business college. Shortly after they became efficient, I found employment as an operator for Mr. Martin in the Chicago Gas Light and Coke Company, where he was employed up to the time he retired on a pension many years later.

I started a small school for operators in the old factory on Illinois Street, Chicago, with Mr. Mackay as teacher. Mr. Tarrant couldn't see any sense in having a school, so I got Mr. Mackay a position as an operator with the Albert Dickinson Seed Company, Chicago, where he is still employed after fortyone years.

The operators which Mr. Mackay turned out were exceptionally good, and nearly all of them very soon procured employment. One of them, John A. Severy, rented an office in the Rookery Building on La Salle Street in Chicago and started an evening school, which turned out another nice group of operators, nearly all of whom soon found employment and were of tremendous value in getting the Comptometer established as a valuable office appliance.

One of those operators, Charles F. Kinkald, was a demonstrator of the Comptometer at the World's Fair in Chicago in 1893, which was the first time that a key-operated calculating machine was ever exhibited at a World's Fair or any other kind of exhibition. Both Comptometers and Comptographs were exhibited there. The Burroughs (American Arithmometer Company) were allotted space, but they did not exhibit.

From that time on, the large railroad offices and the department stores began training operators, usually girls. The report of a contest held at Madison Square Garden, New York in November 1905, reproduced here shows the efficiency attained by some of the earlier operators.

In those days I used to make the prophesy that eventually Comptometers would be taught in the public schools, but did not expect to see it fulfilled to the extent that it has been. It is a long step from that first school taught by Mackay to the hundreds of Comptometer schools now established in many parts of the world. There are now five Comptometer Schools in India, two in South America, five in Australia, and of course, in all the principal cities of Europe. There are over twenty-one Comptometer schools in Great Britain.




Fifth came four Comptometer operators in a sedan simply labeled "Rock Island Comptometer Operators" in large letters printed on cloth.

Seventh, a decorated car driven by an official of the Pierce Petroleum Co., labeled "Pierce Petroleum Company Comptometer Operators."



Dot Whipple left the Chevrolet to return to her home in Muncie, Indiana, and at the present time is working at the Muncie Products Co.






A fortnight after our inaugural meeting we held another general meeting for the special benefit of operators who could not attend the first, so that they should know the objects of our Association.


This is the first time that you have ever heard of us, but we intend that you shall hear much more in the future.


